It would also expand the definition of child pornography to include images that appear to be a minor and images modified to appear to be a specific minor engaged in sexual activity. It would also bar access by a minor to any arcade game rated for "mature audiences" unless accompanied by an adult.	Would make it a felony to sell or rent any video game to anyone under 21 that contains representations or images of excessive violence, nudity or sexual conduct that is harmful to minors or criminal activity.
